In addition to the normal surge of summer time activity there is a significant amount of Stafford County and developer activity around us and directly affecting us. The days of being able to sit back and peaceably enjoy the surrounding forest are gone. On every side we are being penned in by construction ranging from hotels and apartments to clusters of homes and the New Town Center. New concepts such as the Traditional Neighborhood Development (TND), enhanced erosion planning and changes to the county development all have the potential to significantly affect our very way of life. Become informed and involved or be prepared to accept the consequences.

The Board of Directors is actively attempting to work three or four major issues. With the new Town Center the primary issues are the number of residential units, potential road cuts and any effect on ingress and egress from the community. The Stafford County funded study of siltation of Aquia Creek is out in draft form and in my opinion a disappointment. Copies have been provided to the Board of Directors and an appropriate response will soon be forth coming. The issue with transferring lot #1237 (the old basketball court on Aquia Drive) to Stafford County for a new sewage pumping station is down to working out details to ensure it's compatible with the community and has the least impact on the neighbors. After the positive vote on developing the "Old School Site" off Harpoon Drive the Stafford County Board of Supervisors has been asked to remove the deed restriction that designates the site "for recreational use only". In the interim an Ad Hoc committee has been appointed to work on a draft request for proposal (RFP).

The new hay barn is working well and the storage loft above the stalls in the barn is being opened to allow for better ventilation. Kudos to Mike Shepherd and the Host Lions for the renovation of the shelter house at Lions Park. The park looks 100% better. We are also working on upgrading the electrical service so patrons have additional and more reliable electricity.

The Roads and Grounds Crew is expecting their new chipper any day so look for activity in clearing brush along the road beds. The summer 07 paving program is expected to start in early September. Several 20" to 30" trees have fallen across the creek behind homes in the 2050 block on Aquia Drive. We are bringing in a crane crew to work with our team to clear the unwanted dam and remove the potential danger to our bridge.

We have actually seen and signed the Dredging Permit. It has been returned to the Corp of Engineers for their signature. In the very near future a ballot will be going out to get community support to transfer a small slice of land below the stable (across the creek) to Stafford County to build the elevated walkway to Government Island. Part of the agreement

includes Stafford County building a foot bridge for our residents to access the island without having to drive out to Route #1 and down to Coal Landing Road.

Recently there has been a proliferation of unauthorized signs appearing. As a reminder there is a sign regulation and all signs must be approved at the Business Office. Please respect private property and do not post them on utility pole or traffic signs, both of which are against the law.

President's Review

Active Adult Community

The community vote was a majority in favor of developing the Old School Site as an Active Adult Community. We have petitioned the Stafford County Board of Supervisors (BoS) to modify the deed restriction on that property to allow for this type of development. The Chairman of the BoS has agreed to support this request.

At the same time, we have a committee of professional caliber volunteers now working to develop an RFP (Request for Proposals) to go out to developers who specialize in building this type of community. The RFP is a critical document because it will provide all of the guidelines that we expect a developer to abide by to protect our community and get the results that we want to see. There are several developers who are anxious to bid on this project and we will require at least 3 bids.

Siltation of Aquia Creek

We have just now received the Woolpert engineering study of the siltation in Aquia Creek. We are still digesting it and have sent it on to our own engineering consultant for comment. At first glance it seems to lack the substance that we were expecting and there are several components that are glaringly absent. This is not a big surprise to us since we did not pay for the study directly but through our taxes to the county. We will reserve final judgment until we fully grasp the details and understand the report in full context.

Log Jam in the Creek

You may have noticed that a good portion of lot 1237 has been cleared. That is the empty lot on Aquia Drive near Dewy Drive that used to be called "the old basketball court" lot. We are preparing to sell that property to the county so that they can relocate the sewerage pumping station and generator from a homeowner's front yard to a less conspicuous location with proper screening. I was recently paddling up the creek in my kayak to look for upstream sources of siltation when I found a log dam that completely blocked the creek. It appears that a couple of trees fell from the bank on both sides and other logs floated from upstream to pile up a sizable blockage. It poses a flood hazard and also, if a heavy rain event caused high water flow, some logs could break loose and threaten the integrity of the bridge on Aquia Drive. We will be contracting with a tree service to bring in a crane to remove the logs. We hope this will be finished before you read this article. We will post some pictures of it on the website.

Aquia Towne Center

The owners & developers of the new Aquia Towne Center told us that there might be up to 600 apartments built in that space. We objected to that vigorously and they have promised to scale it back to between 250 and 300 units if we don't protest the passage of the new TND ordinance that Stafford County is fast tracking. They have done a traffic study on Washington Drive and other surrounding roads and will soon be approaching us to ask for curb cuts into their property from Washington Drive. We do not own that road but have an easement that specifies only the one existing curb cut. They would add turning lanes to the road and perhaps have one cut that would be a right turn only onto Washington Drive before the gate. They would also share maintenance and snowplowing of the road and make some other concessions to us in order to make it work. They say that they need more access in order to lure new tenants, especially a grocery store. We are resistant to this request and want to know how you feel about it. We will get some dialogue going on our website about this. You can call or e mail me or any other director with your comments about this request. I understand that most people who might be OK with this might not respond and those who have strong feelings will be quick to object. Watch the message board on the website for more info.

Don't jump on a high horse

Note to AHPOA directors: Now that we voters have given you the go-ahead on the "New School Site" plan, which I've called the "Haven on the Hill" project for 55+ residents--It's not a "giddy-up horsey" permit. If you act otherwise, we'll rare up and throw you off, just like earlier when the Board's proposed "special dues assessment" got squashed like a bug.

Don't get me wrong. I've supported the 55+ development concept. But at a Town Hall meeting at the Harbour Inn to discuss the proposal, a couple of items came up that gave me pause.

One, from a new resident, was to the effect that if the vote is positive, then we are giving the AHPOA Board the approval to develop the property. In a sense, that's right in that the Board can spend some money to get consultants' input and advice before proceeding.

But despite what the language on the ballot said, the Board doesn't now get a blank check. As we old-timers well know, actions of the Board are subject to change, as the defeated special dues assessment proved. We residents do have the power to change things--and do.

Another concern from a resident and former builder at the meeting focused on how severely a construction crew trying to clear and erect say 50 new homes would damage Aquia Drive getting to and from the worksite (not to mention rush hour traffic jams inside the Harbour). Unless, he added, a second gate is opened to permit direct access.

Aha! Shouldn't a second gate be a part of the new 55+ community's features anyhow? The answer is as obvious as the nose on your face. Stafford County zoning people would certainly prefer such an arrangement, if only for the sake of faster fire and rescue access to our hinterlands. And the additional traffic the new gate generates when completed could spare Aquia Drive. It could also give future residents of the new development a safer exit and entrance in bad weather.

Besides, I know some third section residents who would dearly love to see a second gate opened regardless of the fate of the 55+ project. A second gate has been a postponed dream of many of the rest of us for many years. One back in 1977 was promised "within a year or two" when my family first moved here.

But another gate would cost money. Exactly. That's just one reason why a stated rationale for promoting the development--that it would help us pay off some existing projects that need attention--is pretty shaky, in my opinion, even without considering a second gate.

Some directors have complained that without such an additional revenue source, many of our amenities needing attention will be neglected. Oh yeah?

Why? After all, the association is now debt free. For any enterprise as substantial as ours, that's nonsensical. We have an excellent credit rating and should use it to advantage while loan rates are still low.

But might it result in a dues increase? Obviously. But check out developments similar to ours, and you'll find our association fees are a bargain. We can afford amenity improvements--to wit, the great new pool at the marina-- and don't need any new Haven on the Hill to finance them. It's simple as that.

That said, the whole project, especially while the area housing market is so lousy, needs much more intelligent deliberation. Our vote wasn't full speed ahead, but proceed with caution. So do it.

Stafford County & R-Board Litter Prevention and Recycling (Julie M. May)

Why Recycle?

The processing of recyclable materials into new products is friendlier to our air and water resources and requires less energy than the processing of raw materials. For example, making an aluminum can from an aluminum can uses 95% less energy than making an aluminum can from virgin ore. Recycling also benefits the local and regional by creating more jobs for those who are involved in the collection, transportation, sorting, and processing of recyclable materials than transporting and landfilling waste. Here in Stafford, the Rappahannock Regional Solid Waste Management Board (R-Board) works with both local and regional companies to process our recyclables.

Everyone has seen the universal recycling symbol with three arrows in the shape of a triangle. But, have you ever stopped to think why that design was chosen? Each arrow represents one step in the recycling process. The first step is the collection of recyclable materials. The second arrow stands for the manufacture of products using recycled materials. The third arrow represents the purchase of products made from or packaged in recycled materials. The arrows are connected to illustrate the never-ending process possible through recycling.

You are probably wondering what products made from recycled materials are available. Mohawk has a line of carpeting that is made from recycled soda and water bottles. This type of plastic is also used to make some fabrics and fleece products. Milk jugs and shampoo bottles are often used to make other plastic containers. For example, the plastics collected in Fredericksburg and Stafford County are purchased by a manufacturer who makes containers for Welch's frozen fruit juice concentrates. Plastic bags from grocery stores are often used to make plastic lumber products like benches and picnic tables. The R-Board does not recycle plastic bags, but they can be returned to the store for recycling. Many cereal and other food boxes are made from recycled paper. Some recyclables like aluminum cans are made over into the same thing.

Often there is a misconception that recycling at home is difficult and time consuming. The R- Board has made it easy for Stafford and Fredericksburg citizens. You can place all food containers in one bin and all paper items in another. You don't need a fancy recycling bin, just use a marker to label a sturdy container, like a storage bin or laundry basket, so your curbside provider knows your recyclables are not trash.

Take a moment and think about the common things you use every day. Can you buy it with recycled content? Could it be recycled when you are finished?
